Curt's Diary:

Caspar Cove
October 16-17

My son Josh and I went diving at Casper Cove on Saturday. We got three lings and lots of ab. We partied that night at the little cabin in Mendo then dove McKericher State Park just north of Fort Bragg on Sunday. Day access is free, with great boat access and a shower on the beach. The conditions were great, flat and calm, which is the type of conditions you need to dive this area. We got huge abs over 9 inches each out around the point, no tanking this day. Great vis at about 30 feet.

Pete and I dove Timber Cove on Saturday. No tanks, just went out and got abs. Conditions were warm with little wind but there was a big swell. We got nice abs again and I got up in kelp on one dive and had two abs in one hand and my weight belt in the other. Good thing Pete was there or I would have had to drop the abs when I got up to the surface. We lost an abalone diver the same day at Sea Ranch, they found his body on Monday at about 20 feet tangled up in kelp. DIVING FANSHELL BEACH (MONTEREY COUNTY)

I recently had an opportunity to dive a location on 17 mile drive in Monterey that is not dove very often. I had been trying to dive Fanshell Beach for quite some time, but it usually has very rough conditions and it is hard to be there when the conditions are perfect.



Twice in the month of November, Carol and I were lucky enough to be there when the conditions were perfect! The ocean was nearly dead calm, it was sunny and the winds were slight.

Fanshell is on 17 mile drive about 2 miles or so north of Stillwater Cove. There is a small parking lot and no facilities. The access is great! (even better than Stillwater Cove). It is a big tourist stop so be ready to answer questions from out of state visitors, especially on a weekend. Park in the lot near the steps on the left side of the lot as you enter.




The beach is on the left and somewhat protected from swells, especially at lower tides. You can dive from the beach or from kayaks. Beach diving here is advanced, but if you use a kayak you can get out to the very calm kelp beds just a five to ten minute paddle away. The kelp beds here are huge and the bottom can range from sandy to boulders and canyons. The visibility here is usually pretty good, on good days it can be 30 to 50 feet. The depth varies from 25 to 100 feet depending on your location.

There are huge lings here in the winter as well as really nice size rock fish and greenlings. The kelp bass are also very big and the fish in general are much bigger than you see in and around Stillwater Cove. There is also a big population of otters and sea lions that frequent this area.

Of the three times I have dove here the sea lions have buzzed me every time looking for a free handout. I shine my big light in their eyes for a bit and they usually leave me alone. So the next time you go down to dive Stillwater Cove and the seas are dead calm with little to no wind think about visiting Fanshell Beach instead, I guarantee a better dive!!!
